Using a pair of glasses as a metaphor for the elements that shape our experiences and identity, the frame of the glasses is the gender, race or ethnic identity we're born into, while the lenses of our glasses reflect our unique personal experience with those around us and other social forces. Through learning and reflection, we can gain deeper insights into what it means to wear our particular set of glasses. When we bring our religious and moral values to bear on the quality of our lenses, we can change what we see and how we respond to racial (and other social) issues.
