The End of Iconoclasm

Affirmation of Orthodox Faith, Synod of Constantinople, March 11, 843 AD

As the Prophets beheld, —as the Apostles have taught, —as the Church has received; —as the Teachers have dogmatized; —as the Universe has agreed; —as Grace has shown forth, —as Truth has revealed; —as Falsehood has been dissolved; —as Wisdom has been presented; as Christ has awarded!

Thus, we declare! —thus we assert —thus we preach Christ our true God: In words, in writings, In thoughts, In sacrifices, In churches, In holy icons, —thus we honor His Saints: worshipping and reverencing Christ as God and Lord —and honoring His Saints as true servants of the same Lord of all —and accordingly offering them veneration.

This is the Faith of the Apostles, —this is the Faith of the Fathers, —this is the Faith of the Orthodox, —this is the Faith which has established the Ecumene.
